## THE REALITY OF SIN

Let us begin where we ended yesterday, namely the immeasurable love that God has for each of us. This divine love is the very foundation of our lives, offering us grace, hope, and redemption. God's love is unconditional and infinite, yet it is essential to recognize that this love calls us into a life of boundaries which protect and nurture the integrity of our relationship with Him and with each other.

In our society, the concept of freedom is often misunderstood. Many perceive it as the ability to do whatever we wish. However, genuine freedom, rooted in divine wisdom, means having the ability to say 'no' to what undermines our authentic relationships with God and others. True freedom allows us to choose pathways that cultivate love, joy, and peace, in contrast to those that lead us astray.

In today's culture, even within Christian communities, we risk losing touch with the reality of sin. Modern society often promotes moral relativism, suggesting that personal fulfillment outweighs absolute truths. This mindset numbs our awareness of sin by redefining it as mere personal preference, eroding accountability and distancing us from God. When we rationalize sinful actions or dismiss sin altogether, we fail to acknowledge the profound impact it has on our souls and our relationship with God. Let us awaken to the truth of sin's reality, seeking God's grace to live authentically in His light and truth.

The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* defines sin as "an offense against reason, truth, and right conscience; it is failure in genuine love for God and neighbor caused by a perverse attachment to certain goods" (no. 1849). Sin, at its core, is a turning away from God, a choice to focus inwardly on our own desires, neglecting the divine invitation to love selflessly. In choosing sin, we disrupt the harmonious relationship God desires to have with us. Sin is not merely a break in rules, but a rupture in relationship. When we sin, we choose our will over God's will, prioritizing our selfish desires over the loving communion He calls us to embrace. This self-centered turn not only impacts our relationship with God but also injures our relationships with others, as it leads us to actions and attitudes that hurt and divide.

When we choose sin, we are, in essence, saying to God that we believe the temptation before us will bring us more happiness than His love can provide. This choice suggests a profound misunderstanding of God's boundless mercy and joy. Each sin becomes a statement, implying that fleeting, false promises of temptation outweigh the everlasting fulfillment found in Him.

## G O I N G D E E P E R

Take an extra 15 minutes for prayer today. Begin by reading Isaiah 65:1-2 Read it once to familiarize yourself with the text. Then, read it a second time, slowing down to focus on the word or phrase that resonates with you. Read it a third time, again slowly, and see if the same word or phrase still speaks to you. Finally, have a conversation with God about how this word or phrase relates to your life. Take a moment to listen and invite God to speak to you.
